Just prior to the competition season starting we tried to organise a Goulburn under 18's representative side to play Oak Hill College as a pre-season warm up, but, unfortunately Trinity College would not release their players. This is something that we need to look at for next year as it would be a positive for Goulburn Rugby to have a representative side, it gives the players a goal to aim for and will lift rugby in the communities eyes. Needless to say the game went ahead, but we were comprehensively beaten. Even so, it was a great day, something that the lads really enjoyed and look forward to doing next year.

We had a very young side this year with most of the team just turning seventeen and three of the players still sixteen, this all goes well for next year when we will still have a large nuclease of experienced players who will be much bigger and stronger, an important issue in this age group , when a year can make a big difference.

The team finished fifth in the comp with a 50% success rate This team had a fantastic esprit de corps, were very competitive in the second grade comp, and were unlucky not to make the finals.



Coach's Report

The Goulburn Dirty Reds enjoyed a highly successful seasons on many fronts during 2007. Both first and second grade teams won their respective premierships, there were strong senior player numbers avoiding the need for players to back up during away games, continued development of the junior club, successful off field events including the Annual Rugby Ball and the planned development of Poidevin Oval over the coming off season all indicate the strength of the club, with the prospect to consolidate this position over the coming seasons.

The firsts finished the season as deserved undefeated premiers. Capably led by Anthony Allport in his first season as captain, firsts scored 523 points for, while only conceding 43 points, beating all comers throughout the season.

Much of the current teams' development can be attributed to the influence of Ben Pearson over recent seasons. Coupled with a well balanced team of younger and experienced players, firsts have the prospect to potentially dominate the competition for a number of seasons to come.

The 2nd grade team were not the competition front runners but improved their game to take out the premiership by the barest of margins. Seconds had a number of former first grade players adding their experience to the younger and less experienced team members.

The standard of second grades game genuinely improved, with the final 3 games of the season being quality fixtures. Ben Moore and Joel McPherson grew in stature as the season progressed and should play many seasons in first grade in the years to come.

Ben Pearson, Jason Kremer, Nick Hartin, Aaron Wilde and Evan Dougal are all first grade standard players, although fitting them into an undefeated team was difficult. A successful reserve grade team is the essence of a successful club as pressure for places in first grade is applied establishing valuable positional depth.

The fruits of the junior program were evident this season with Ben Moore and Dale Backhouse successfully integrating into the senior club. Ben Moore in particular enjoyed a successful season and will play a higher standard of rugby as he matures. Ben is a wonderful example of what the club can hope to expect from the junior program. Congratulations to all involved with the junior club, you can all take credit for the positive contribution of the junior club to the senior teams.

The club support staff including Gary Stevens, Anthony White, Geoff Shepherd, Bob Whitaker, Liz McLaughlin and Colin Groves generously gave their time each weekend to do the things that get teams on the paddock, but generally go unnoticed by the players and spectators.

As members of the rugby club you have all contributed positively to the success 2007. Club Presidents do not come any better than the tireless Matt Klem, the Dirty Reds are fortunate indeed to have Klemmy in the club.

Grand Final day was a fitting highlight of the season, with the Reds demonstrating to the local community a successful and cohesive unit. It will be a day remembered fondly by all involved, players and spectators alike. This experience will provide cherished memories for all for a range of different reasons and should provide momentum going into 2008.

The Future of the club looks positive, with a great sense of camaraderie amongst the players on and off the field. Club Captain Boyd Newby led from the front with after game festivities and was a suitable choice as club captain.


It wasn't the largest defeat the Reds have inflicted on the Bushrangers, with the Goulburn side racking up an 85-0 drubbing last season.


It would have taken a truck to stop the human wrecking ball from that far out, and Webber added the extras.

Red Wash!!

IT was the perfect end to the perfect season for the Goulburn Dirty Reds. The undefeated first grade side won their first premiership since 1977, running riot over a hapless Tuggeranong Vikings side 55-5. But they weren't alone, with the Dirty Twos side getting the glory earlier in the day with a nail-biting 15-14 victory over the competition front runners Royals.

The rare double was completed in front of a massive home crowd, with winger Neil Gustafson crossing the whitewash four times to blow Tuggeranong off the park. His fellow winger Jay Butler got the ball rolling with a try early on, chasing down a chip kick to dive over in the corner. The home crowd could tell they were on a good thing, and settled in to watch the show.

The Reds' game-plan was to avoid Tuggeranong's powerful pack, and they stuck to it, with veteran fly-half Matthew Klem putting on the side's second try, kicking a chip over the top for Gustafson to fly onto the ball, shrug off the Tuggeranong winger and dive over for a 14-0 lead. But for a while, the Reds had to showcase their defensive skills, repelling waves of Tuggeranong attack. The Reds were also on the wrong side of the penalty count, as they struggled to counter the Vikings rolling maul.

Captain Anthony Allport took it one step too far, and was yellow carded for again collapsing the maul. But the Vikings couldn't take advantage of the one man overlap, and the Reds defended their line ferociously. The Reds extended their lead through a Mikael Webber penalty, and they constantly looked threatening with the ball in hand.

Butler again put his powerful running on show, making a break and fending off a couple of Vikings players. He was brought down just short of the line, but from the ensuing ruck rampaging second rower Boyd Newby rammed his way over the line next to the upright. The score was 24-0, and the game looked beyond doubt before Tuggeranong finally got their maul going and crossed just before half

The break didn't slow the Reds down, and they continued to hammer Tuggeranong through the backs. The Goulburn side scored one of their best tries of the season after the break.

Flanker Pete Debeer picked up a loose ball at the line out near the Reds' 22, and raced up field. The fleet-footed flanker stepped past several would-be Vikings' defenders,



and off loaded to Ben Green, who was trailing in support. Green pinned his ears back and raced for the line, but ran out of room and flicked the ball back to Anthony Yeo. Yeo charged for the line and passed to Allport, who smashed his way over the line. The try sent the crowd and players into raptures, and Webber put the icing on the try with a glorious sideline conversion.

Another individual effort from Gustafson saw the Reds extend their lead to 38-5, and Chris Kilby, who had been the only Reds' forward not to score this year, got in on the act and crossed near the corner. Gustafson ended the game with his fourth try, with the ref's whistle kicking off celebrations right around the ground.

For those involved in last year's heartbreaking grand final loss against Harden, it was a redeeming win. It's been a long season for the Reds. They've overcome a lack of a home ground for the first half of the season, and the best that the Monaro competition could throw at them to come out on top.

End of Season Tour - New Zealand

For the first time in around 18 years, the Goulburn Dirty Reds decided to take an end of season tour overseas. 
