In 2010 the club, in conjunction with the Goulburn Domestic Violence Committee, held it's first "Say No to Violence against Women" gala day. One of the highlights of the day was a match between the Fermented Reds and an invitational golden oldies side in which long time assistant manager Geoffrey Shepherd played his first game AND scored a try on debut. There has never been a more popular try at Poidevin Oval—it truly was the try of the year.

Another highlight of that day was the first grade match in which the side wore specially designed white jumpers that were auctioned that night and raised \$6,000 towards the cause. It's hoped that this will now go on to be an annual event.

Throughout the year, the clubhouse edged even closer to completion providing a great place to entertain players, visitors, supporters and guests as well as a shelter spot from which to watch the rugby.

While there were to be no premierships in 2010, it was another great year for the club. Even though we had started to get used to premierships, the truth is that historically, we had only had them sporadically. The strength of the club had always been love of the game and the strength of the Goulburn Rugby family and those aspects were as strong as ever in 2010.

Fermented Reds v Gentlemen of Sydney Saturday, May 1 2010 (SFS)

Fermented Reds go to Ella and Back By CHRIS GORDON

It was a match for the ages – old ages mostly – when the Goulburn Fermented Reds defeated the Gentleman of Sydney at the Sydney Football Stadium on Saturday.

Finishing with three tries to one, the Reds covered themselves in glory (along with yards of strapper's tape and litres of liniment) against a side that included rugby greats Mark Ella, Steve Talbot, Richard Tombs and Anthony Abrahams among others.

The Goulburn invitation to play was organised by Simon Poidevin, who hadn't played for Goulburn since his starring role in the 1977 grand final win against Bowral. As if it wasn't surreal enough running down the tunnel onto the SFS with Ella's team and the crowd cheering the Fermented Reds on, someone yelled out "Queenslander", mixing up both the state they were from and the sport they were playing. None of the Reds seemed to mind, though, as they ran out with their eyes as big as saucers, like seven year olds at Christmas.

Poidevin, who captained the side and led them on to the field, had signalled his intent to tackle Ella at some stage and even donned the unaccustomed fly half jumper to mark his former Randwick, Waratahs and Wallabies team mate.

The Goulburn side resembled a classic hits radio station, - the greats of the 70s, 80s, 90s and today. And the big hits kept on coming – but sadly Poidevin never got to lay one on Ella. Nonetheless, despite years of retirement, they both clearly still had talent to spare.

Even though the Fermented Reds struggle to remember their own names or what they've done five minutes ago, they somehow managed to remember their combinations from their playing years. Goulburn took a fluid approach to the game (in keeping with what they'd ingested in large quantities before it) and rotated reserves regularly. Forwards Owen Taylor, David Neal, Glen Piazza, Ian Gulson, Sam White, Billy Cooper, Andrew McKenzie, Sam Tabner, Evan Dougall, Dave Anable, Matt O'Rourke and both Ben Pearsons controlled the rucks and mauls, giving Goulburn's backs plenty of clean ball. Jake Bourne made the best of one opportunity, taking a well timed pass from the ageless Joey Fitzgibbon after he broke



through on the right flank before passing to Bourne for the try.

Age had not wearied quite a few of the players and Poidevin, in his first visit to the bench, even commented that "some of those boys are serious out there." Matt Klem, in his first game back since a broken ankle forced his retirement two years ago, was the first injury when he had a facial cut seen to, but quickly made his way back on to the field. Later in the game Shaun McKavanagh came off with one of those injuries that backs tend to get but aside from that, both sides remained injury free.

The Gentlemen of Sydney, a cunning lot, made clever use of boxing legend Johnny Lewis and former Wallaby Richard Tombs. Tombs was wearing red shorts due to a neck injury, and Lewis wearing gold due to ...well... his age, meaning they couldn't be tackled but they could set up plays and give their team mates a breather. Actually, both sides appreciated that, so well done fellas.

At half time, inspiring coach and rugby legend Evan Fraser spoke to the Goulburn side and told them to just enjoy themselves, and that's what they did. Goulburn's backs, including Bob Whittaker, Steve Shepherd, Campbell Boileau, Garry Stephens, Dean Thompson, Beau Croker, Kevin Kara and Darryl Atkins, stretched out well and had a few chances in the second half but it was the selfish Jake Bourne who scored next

with his second try.

Mark White had two false starts out wide; one ending when he was tackled by Daily Telegraph journalist and occasional rugby critic Paul Kent, and the second chance snuffed out when a side-stepping White side-stepped into team-mate Billy Cooper. White was luckier on his third attempt though, receiving a neat pass from Ben "Booboo" Pearson from a great centre-field break, and then passing back infield to the waiting arms of Joe Fitzgibbon who scored under the black dot.

The Gentlemen of Sydney finally got on the board for a five pointer just after the final hooter, but it was still a sensational win for Goulburn, establishing a 100 per cent success record at the SFS and against Mark Ella captained sides.

Goulburn finished with 15 points, ironically the same number of times their bus had to pull over on the way home, and Ben "Yogi" Pearson was awarded player of the match by Goulburn rugby stalwart Gordon Cabot. A match followed this one, between the Waratahs and the Auckland Blues, but try as it might, it never reached the same heights.

The Fermented Reds wish to thank all those concerned for allowing us this rare opportunity and look forward to catching up with other members of their aged brethren at the Golden Oldies World Cup in October.

Reds rout Beasts By CHRIS GRIFFIN

The Goulburn Worker's Club Dirty Reds' season could not have got off to a more promising start than their 62 -7 walloping of East Canberra on Saturday at Griffith Oval in Canberra.

With two away games to dispose of before the opening home game of the season at Poidevin Oval in two weeks time, the Reds showed one of the new teams in the newly expanded competition that they are as hungry as ever for another Premiership title after completing three in a row last season.

While a number of the established and seasoned Reds players from the last three seasons led by example on the weekend, it was the performances of some of the local juniors now filtering through the ranks that had both the Coach and the Reds faithful on the sidelines excited about the Reds' prospects this year.

The Reds pack consistently out muscled and outscrapped their larger opponent forward pack who chose uncontested scrums from the outset, but it was the backline that lit up and caused havoc all day. They looked dangerous every time the ball was spun wide and considering it was the first hit out of the season, ball handling was exceptional.

Ever improving Aiden Greaves and seasoned performer Jeff Caldwell continually hitting MikWebber on the chest with the ball, and it was a case of whether it would be Webber himself or his new centre partner Chris Shepherd busting the line or dishing off to the speedy back trio of Tivey, Ben Hogan or Adam Lachlan to get to the try line.

Lachlan in particular showed that he will prove a major headache for opposing backlines this season with his elusive running and exceptional speed.

In a pack that totally dominated their opposition, Captain/Coach Justin Benn and evergreen prop Dave Anable led by example with Benn scoring a hat trick of tries and Big Jack getting across the line once again. One of the younger forward brigade Rob McCarthy also run 50m to outpace the East backs and post his first 5 pointer of the season.

In the backs, Mik Webber continued on his strong pre season form with two tries, whilst Ben Hogan, Adam Lachlan and Chris Shepherd all showed early season form with a 5 pointer each.

While Webber would admit to having an ordinary day with the boot, he still managed to knock over six conversions taking his personal tally for the game to 22 points.

A number of players were unavailable in both grades this week due to work commitments and special mention must go out to those players who backed up from seconds and ended up playing almost two full games, particularly Jeff Caldwell and Chris Shepherd and Benny Moore.

Coach Justin Benn got the squad together after the game and praised their first up effort, but also stated that one of the areas the players will have to work on as the season goes on is their intensity and not getting dragged down by opposing teams scrappy play or niggling as was prevalent on Saturday against Easts.

All in all though he said it was a good early season indicator as to where the Reds are at present with Easts club expected to finish mid pack at the end of the season.

First Grade

Following on from their superb first up win away against East Canberra last week, the Goulburn Workers Club Dirty Reds kept their away record intact with a 38-12 win against front-runners Hall at Hall.

From the kick off, Hall put Goulburn under pressure on their line.

Webber sniffed out an intercept and was on his way to run 70m to the try line and was unlucky to be pulled back by the referee for a Hall penalty on the opposite side of the field.

Hall again pressured the Goulburn line and broke through minutes later with a try under the posts that Webber successfully converted.

From the kick off and with only minutes till the half time whistle it was Goulburn's turn to pressure the line with big Dave Anable carrying a number of defenders a whisker from the line.

Scrum half Aiden Greaves was quick to clear to his backs with Webber finding Benny Moore out wide who barged over for another try which Webber converted for a 12-7 half-time lead.

Both sides blew several attacking opportunities in the opening 15 minutes of the second half with poor handling, but Goulburn's forwards were starting to get on a roll with the tight five making good ground and the loose forwards pouncing on any loose ball.

The backs capitalised on this and started to break Halls defensive line more regularly and with the young backline sending out a warning to the other teams in the competition.

Goulburn ran riot over the Bushrangers in the last 20 minutes with "Mr Rugby" Webber fittingly adding the final points in the final minute of play through a brilliant chip and chase he regathered and raced away to score under the posts for his own conversion.

Coach Justin Benn said it was as a massive effort to come to Hall and come away with such a strong win so early in the season. While he cautioned the players to not get carried away yet, he said that he was excited about the

combinations that were coming together both in the forwards and the backs, particularly the younger players that have stepped up.

Saturday, 15 May 2008

After starting the season in the best possible fashion posting over 100 points in the first two rounds, the Goulburn Workers Dirty Reds came crashing back to earth on Saturday at the hands of Tuggerenong, who put on a powerhouse and clinical display of rugby.

Whilst Goulburn took the Vikings head on in the forwards and consistently got over their opposition, it was the well oiled and experienced Vikings backline that wreaked havoc for most of the match.

It was the Vikings backline that put posted first points of the game after only 5 minutes play after splitting the Goulburn defensive line on their quarter and sprinting 70 metres through several sets of hands to the fullback who scored out near the corner post giving them a 5 nil lead.

Apart from another elusive 40m run and chip and chase from fullback Adam Lauchlan that almost resulted in a try to the Reds, Goulburn spent most of the first 20 minutes in their own half keeping out repeated Vikings raids.

Through a great clearing kick from Mik Webber and an equally good chase by Andrew Tivey, Goulburn pinned Tuggerenong down in their quarter and after repeated scrum and ruck infringements in the first half, Goulburn received a penalty outside the quarter which Webber shaved the posts but failed to convert.

Goulburn kept the pressure on the Vikings pinning them in their own quarter for a number of phases until the ball went out along the backline from the scrum to Webber who sucked in two defender before offloading to winger Ben Hogan who raced away to score in the corner.

A superb conversion from Webber from the sideline saw Goulburn hit the lead 7-5. Despite leading the game at this stage Goulburn were dropping off quite a few first tackles and letting the Vikings machine get on a roll.

This roll resulted in a try to the Vikings forwards wide out which was unconverted taking the score to 10-7 in their favour.

Tuggerenong once again peppered the Goulburn line from the kick off but a drop goal attempt by the Vikings let Goulburn off the hook before the break easing the pressure and allowing Webber to clear 60m to the other end of the field for one

last attacking raid before the break. The ball however was knocked on 5m out from the line and the siren went for half time.

At the break, Coach Justin Benn wanted his troops to concentrate on making those first tackles, getting more aggressive at the breakdown right across the park and continue with the forward pods running closely off 5/8 Ben Todkill.

Goulburn couldn't have managed a worse start to the second half, failing to get on the loose ball which was scooped up by the Vikings centre who raced away and offloaded for a try under the posts. The conversion made it 24-7.

In the 15th minute Justin Benn decided to inject himself with great effect firing up his forward pack with some damaging runs.

But against the run of play, the Vikings again capitalized on a loose ball and a backline move resulted in an unconverted try in the corner, 29-7.

Goulburn kicked off, and some individual brilliance by Rob McCarthy who raced through and took the kick off on the fly, snatching the ball from the Vikings grasp and running 30 metres through a number of defenders to score in the corner.

Webber failed to convert from the sideline, 29-12 and Goulburn had a sniff.

But after quite a bit of time spent defending their line from the kick off, Goulburn once again saw the might of the Tuggers backline who ran in yet another 5 pointer out wide that was unconverted,34-12

From the kick off Goulburn received a penalty on the quareter line and quickly spun the ball wide out through the backs to hit a flying Lachlan who scored in the corner, 34-17.

Toby White was forced to leave the field at this point with a nasty face cut.Goulburn were fired up and once again got themselves to within 5 metres of the line.

From a scrum penalty, Webber through a dummy that fooled even the referee and barged over out wide but couldn't manage the coversion.

Tuggerenong once again attacked Goulburn from the kick off and it was only a try saving tackle by fullback Lachlan that stopped the line being crossed again.

Against the run of play again, Tuggerenong scooped up a loose ball and ran 50m to score out wide with the conversion hitting the posts on the siren leaving the final score at 39-22.

It was a much improved second half display by Goulburn but not enough to peg

back the deficit.

Goulburn was well served in the forwards by some hard running from Jordan Chandler, Rob McCarthy and Justin Benn in the second half whilst Josh Hogan scrapped well all day for the ball.

In the backs, Aiden Greaves was good around the scrum base, Webber was as always strong defensively and in breaking the line and Adam Lachlan looked slick whenever handling the ball again.

More poor defence gave Cooma a try following a 50 metre run up the sideline, but then Jordan Wilcox pushed Goulburn back into the lead with another try.


The quality of the Goulburn performance was inconsistent, but they saved a brilliant try for the end.



THE Goulburn Dirty Reds first grade side capped off a fantastic day of Rugby at Poidevin Oval on Saturday with an emphatic 43-14 win over a super fit ADFA outfit.

To their credit, the Reds regrouped and came back at ADFA in the final 10 minutes, running in a try out wide to make the final score 34-31. The Two's have put in some gutsy performances in the second half of the season and with some of the youngsters in the side all looks well

for the club next year.

As part of the Say No to Violence against Women Gala Day, a great day of rugby was capped off by a Golden Oldies game between the Fermented Reds and a celebrity side going by the name of the Say No Allstars.

The side featured local identities including council general manager Chris Berry, local radio announcer Rick Shipp, local rugby league stalwart Steve Freebody, record breaking former first grade Reds coach Matt O'Rourke and ex-Wallaby John Langford.

The side's coach mayor Carol James and manager Pru Goward were both present in support of the day and the game was played in fantastic spirit.

The Goulburn Workers Club Dirty Reds have secured a spot in the ACTRU first division semi-finals after a 31-0, five try haul against Wests at Aranda on Saturday.

Over the last few weeks, the Reds have focused on improving their discipline and adherence to the game plan and the lopsided score against sixth placed was built on the back of that. Goulburn's forwards were dominant in set play and at the breakdown, with Toby White in sensational form.

The Reds kept the scoreboard ticking over steadily with a try every ten minutes. Matt Bird was first on the board followed by Rob McCarthy and Toby White, with Mik Webber converting the second two tries.

As a result, Wests were forced into a scrappy, spoiling sort of game at the breakdown, trying to stem the flow of points. Numerous infringements by Wests were met with warnings by the referee as the vocal Goulburn crowd unsuccessfully called for players to be carded.

Midway through the first half, frustration from both sides – from Goulburn due to the ongoing infringements, from Wests due to the ongoing scoring – boiled over into a few punches but it didn't last long and didn't escalate beyond that point.

Coach Justin Benn was mostly satisfied at half time, but warned the Reds to keep focus and not be sucked into a scrappy game, and to concentrate on counter rucking.

Goulburn added two more tries in the second half, one each to Jeff Caldwell and Rob McCarthy – his second for the day – but the Reds' opportunities were limited by Wests dogged determination to shut them down.

When a card finally did come from the referee's pocket for ongoing infringements by Wests, it was used as yet another warning and no-one

was given time off.

Despite that stern warning, ongoing niggle crept into the match as it became a bit willing and the match was pulled up a few minutes early with Goulburn comfortable winners.

Best and fairest points went to Toby White (3), David Hook (2) and Rob McCarthy (1) with McCarthy also picked as Players' Player.

The five competition points from the match, and the four they will get from next week's bye moved Goulburn to 56 points and a guarantee of at least third spot on the ladder.

Tuggeranong and Gungahlin were on 55 and 50 points respectively before this weekend and Goulburn could possibly finish in second spot if Gungahlin were to lose one of their last two matches, or as high as first spot if the seemingly invincible Tuggeranong side lost both of its last two.

DIRTY TWOS

It would be great to be able to say the Dirty Twos finished the year on a high, but that wasn't the case.

This was not the best game they'd played this year, and not just because

they were on the losing end of a 33-7 scoreline.

Ability wise there didn't seem to be a great gap between the two sides but Goulburn made Wests job easier by handing over possession frequently.

The Twos were starved of the ball and rarely had possession for more than two successive phases while Wests looked confident running with ball in hand.

Seasoned prop Ben "Yogi" Pearson scored Goulburn's only try right on the finish with Luke Shaw converting it for the Two's final match of the year.

For Dirty Twos coach Dave Ellison the most gratifying aspects would have been that the entire side kept trying until the finish, with top efforts from Ben "Booboo" Pearson, Justin Benn, Nathan Hewett and Eli Bailey', and that many players had continued to improve throughout the season.

That and the unearthing of new talent could bode well for next season.

Players Player award and three best and fairest points went to Luke Shaw for one of his best ever games for the club, with Ben "Yogi" Pearson (2) and Mark Kilby (1) earning the other points.

Dirty Reds deposed By CHRIS GORDON

Despite leading for most of the match, reigning premiers the Goulburn Workers Dirty Reds bowed out of the 2010 rugby season with a disappointing 21-18 loss to Hall Bushrangers.

Goulburn's performance was in stark contrast to their last two matches in which the Reds had played virtually mistake free games, getting all of the little things right and dominating all facets of play.

Against Hall, none of the bits came together.

Passes didn't stick, scrums didn't hold and lineouts and breakdowns were frequently stolen by the Bushrangers. It wasn't a match where the effort was lacking, but it was poorly applied.

Starved of the ball and field position, Hall's score could have been much higher except for Goulburn's solid defence which held even as other facets slipped away.

The Bushrangers had a swag of opportunities with the ball but were only able to cross the line twice, once in each half.

Goulburn was first on the scoreboard through a Mik Webber penalty goal but Hall responded with their first try shortly after.

The Reds regained the lead fifteen minutes in, with another Webber penalty goal, and Goulburn was up by 6-5.

Ten minutes short of half time Webber missed another penalty goal but more than made up for it a minute later with a try from a brilliant stepping run that left three Hall defenders tripping over each other.

Webber converted but the Reds were soon on the back foot with Hall pressuring their line again.

Despite sustained pressure, the Bushrangers were unable to cross for a try and, when offered a penalty, took the option of a shot at goal to trail 13-8 at half-time.

The Reds confidence was high coming back from the break and there was a feeling they had got the lethargy from a week off out of their systems.

There were some good early indications. On the occasions they put phases together, the Goulburn pack made good yards through the middle of Hall, but on almost every occasion the ball was turned over.

Hall was first to score in the second half with a converted try fifteen minutes in that gave them a 15-13 lead.

Another Webber try five minutes later put Goulburn back ahead by three but a Hall penalty goal levelled the score.

A draw would have put Goulburn through to the preliminary final as the higher placed team on the ladder, but patience and a tactically astute game from Hall denied them that chance.

The Bushrangers showed a healthy respect for Goulburn's defence throughout the match. Appreciating the difficulty of getting through or

around Goulburn's defence, they chose to go over.

Whenever offered penalty goal points, Hall wisely accepted and they peppered the goal posts with field goal attempts scattered throughout both halves.

The first three of those attempts missed, but the fourth and most crucial - three minutes from full time was successful, giving Hall the lead, the win and a spot in the final.

Having won the last three premierships, the Reds were disappointed to not have a chance to defend the title this year, but Hall had the better game plan and the better game on the day and were deserved winners.

Mik Webber once again scored all of Goulburn's points (two tries, one conversion, two penalty goals).

Another of the club's teams, the Tablelands Reds Under 16s, also made it through to the playoff end of the season, The Under 16s met Royals in the final but were unfortunately beaten by 21-7
